Youth Volunteerism, Digital Literacy and Community Development:

A Case Study of the 'Volunteer for My Community' Program and 'Adolescent and Youth Reference Group' in Cambodia

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Introduction

Volunteer for My Community Program (VMC) is the Cambodia's national and largest volunteer program under the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sport (MoEYS) and has been implemented since 2019. Adolescent and Youth Reference Group (ARYG), on the other hand, was established with the support of UNICEF and composed of adolescents and youths aged 15-25, nominated by various non-governmental organizations (NGOs). VMC and AYRG are volunteering hubs that aim to build youths' capacity building and community development through community-based projects proposed by the youth volunteers. Thousands of youth volunteers have participated in the program and initiated hundreds of projects to solve community issues.

Due to the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic, the VMC digitalized itself into an entirely online-based program in 2021. The VMC system has been set up to ensure sustainability and achieve its goals. With this principle, VMC created a strategic and management framework guideline, implementation guideline, standardized youth project proposal template, VMC website, etc. AYRG also has the implementation guideline through the strategic plan from 2021-2023. It has a logical framework which the goal is to lead AYRG to become a strong leading network to advocate for the betterment of adolescent's and youths' well-being.

With the support from Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade through The Asia Foundation's Ponlok Chomnes program, Child Rights Coalition Cambodia (CRC) conducted a study on "Youth Volunteerism, Digital Literacy and Community Development: The Case of the Volunteering for My Community (VMC) Program in Cambodia and Adolescent and Youth Reference Group (AYRG)." The study proposes critical findings focusing on how youth volunteerism contributes to

- A). youths' capacity development;
- B). community development;
- C). institutional capacity development;
- D). digital integration in the programs.

Research objective & key questions

This research seeks to understand the skills that were developed by youth volunteers through volunteerism. It identifies the soft and digital skills they gained and improved upon throughout their work in the program. Also, it showed how youth volunteers contributed to community development. It also aims to understand how the program improved the institutional management and support of youth volunteers in their locations. The results should be used to provide concrete recommendations to improve the program. VMC and AYRG were utilized for this research. This research is designed to answer specific questions, as follows:

have the VMC and AYRG operated to build youths' skills and community development, including climate change? How has digital technology been used in that process?



How

much has digital literacy been promoted among youth volunteers nationwide? What gaps are there to further improve?




How

have VMC and AYRG youth volunteer-led projects contributed to community development, especially in areas of green development and climate change?







Overall rating from Vunerable Group 13 key activities







VMC and AYRG designed core courses to offer trainings for youth volunteers/networks before commencing their project proposal and implementation. The skills identified by the respondents mostly matched courses offered by the programs, baseline, and endline surveys of the VMC. It showed that pre-placement training courses would be well-performed to equip youth volunteers with some basic skills to be able to use during their placement.



What do you think have the VMC and AYRG achieved in terms of digital literacy for youths?




Youth Capacity Development

In your opinion, to what extent has the community received the following developments from the VMC or the AYRG?





To what extent have the VMC or the AYRG contributed to the following activities in community development on climate change?










12 digital skills were identified to contribute to institutional capacity development.

- The top three "excellence" skills included: 1). computer skills, 2). social media, and 3). Facebookpage management.
- Presently, VMC uses a Facebook page, website, Google Maps, YouTube, and Telegram to communicate and promote the program.

Digital integration in VMC and AYRG

Digital integration in the VMC has been introduced gradually since the program's inception, with some basic computer skills. By 2019, provincial youth volunteers had developed their project proposals using Microsoft Word and PowerPoint for project presentations. Social activities were disrupted during the pandemic, and the VMC was implemented entirely online. By 2022, it had implemented a hybrid system where some key activities were conducted online.

Digital knowledge is an essential factor in promoting youth participation throughout the country and promoting changes and impacts in the community. However, there were still many challenges to introducing new technology to the institutions at both national and sub-national levels. The three main challenges identified were: 1) a technology mindset, 2) human resources to manage and maintain, and 3) financing


Based on the Digital Score for VMC, 43% of program implementation has been done online and 57% in-person, compared to 53% online for AYRG and 47% in person.

DoEYS seemed to recognize the significance of technology, but the intention to learn and improve was still in question. Moreover, human resources to support the online system are challenging in the MoEYS and DoEYS. Lastly, finances are needed to run and support the online activities.

Digital integration in VMC and AYRG

Recommendation

The digital environment is becoming increasingly important across most aspects of children's and youth's lives, including during times of crisis, as societal functions, including communication, education, government services, and commerce, progressively come to rely upon digital technologies. VMC and AYRG members are also using online platforms and need training on how to use social media privacy settings to keep their pictures and personal information safe, how to set a stronger password to protect users' accounts, and how to understand and avoid the practices of online predators. This includes training on how to report risky or abusive content to social media platforms so that appropriate actions can be taken.

The five categories below were recommended by VMC and AYRG members. The recommendations call for both technical and resource (human and financing) support and key interventions from key ministries, local authorities, schools, teachers, youth themselves, parents, civic societies, individual expert, donors, development partners, and UN agencies.

Training

- Conduct more training/workshops for youth volunteers to have sufficient skills to work and develop the communities more effectively.
- Strengthen training on new knowledge in terms of science and digital technology.
- Strengthen training on Microsoft Office, critical thinking, administration work, and Google Maps.
- Develop a standard training curriculum and convert those courses into an online platform.

Explore Opportunities and Resource Support

- Provide opportunities for youth volunteers to participate in national and international events/programs.
- Support adequate financial support for youth volunteers to run their projects.
- Support technical and digital equipment for volunteers to access online trainings and run projects.

- Consider having more focus on climate change, green development, and skills for volunteers and volunteer-led projects.
- Continue to review and update the VMC manual and tools following the evidence from the implementation and global standard for volunteer for development.
- Play a role in facilitating all development partners (DPs) and organizations working on volunteerism to work together to bring change in the communities through volunteering work.
- Consider partnerships with DPs and own income generation to ensure the sustainability of the program.
- Integrate and introduce technology to young people and rural youth is vital and, the program should consider providing computers and other device to support them.

Strengthening and Networking

- Strengthen the quality of pre-placement training courses and the induction system to ensure that youth volunteers have enough knowledge about the program to be able to work with the local communities and authorities, especially soft skills.
- Strengthen the provincial volunteer recruitment process to promote "inclusiveness" by encouraging youths from various groups to take part, including person with disability, LGBTIQ, indigenous, and vulnerable groups, etc.
- Strengthen online support mechanisms for volunteers and the community.
- Conduct an annual reflection meeting to document the achievements and lessons learned from all provinces and youth volunteers.

Evidence and advocacy

- Influence the development of the standard volunteering framework in Cambodia to ensure the impact and development of the volunteering work. Moreover, it ensures that the duty of care is fully provided to the volunteers and communities.
- Generate and using the evidence from VMC and AYRG program implementation and core principles/guidance from the global standard for volunteering for development to localize or develop national volunteering standards to promote and guide quality volunteering practice and volunteering recognition in Cambodia.
- Advocate with MoEYS and the Ministry of Economy and Finance (MEF) to allocate more budget to support the VMC program.

Development of the related databases and guidelines

- Develop a recruitment process for NGOs' parents.
- Develop the VMC strategic and management guidelines.
- Develop an annual report template to showcase the program's achievements.
- Develop and standardize duties of care for volunteers as guided by the Global Volunteering Standard.
- Develop an online certificate that all volunteers can download from the system at any time.
- Develop an AYRG implementation guideline.
